

Candidates for the Hampshire and Isle of Wight Police Force Area

Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) elections are taking place on 2nd May in England and Wales.

Find out who your local candidates are and how to vote.



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About Police and Crime Commissioners

On 2nd May, you will be able to vote for your Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC). The role of the PCC is to be the voice of the people and to hold the police to account.

Police and Crime Commissioners are elected to hold your police force to account for delivering the kind of policing you want to see. PCCs are responsible for the totality of policing in their force area and aim to cut crime and deliver an effective and efficient police service. PCCs bring a public voice to policing and they do this by:

- Engaging with the public and victims of crime to help set police and crime plans;
- Ensuring the police force budget is spent where it matters most; and
- Appointing the chief constable, holding them to account for delivery of their objectives, and if necessary, dismissing them.

The PCC does not "run" the police force. Chief constables continue to be responsible for the day-to-day operations of the police, but they are accountable to the public via the PCC.

In some Police Force Areas, PCCs are also responsible for Fire and Rescue Services, and are known as Police, Fire and Crime Commissioners (PFCCs). Furthermore, in some areas, neither a PCC nor PFCC is elected – instead there will be an election for a Mayor who will hold the PCC, PFCC or equivalent powers.

37 PCCs will be elected across England and Wales, of which 4 will be PFCCs – PFCCs are found in Cumbria, Essex, Staffordshire, and Northamptonshire.

Work with others

PCCs also work with your council and other organisations to promote and enable joined up working on community safety and criminal justice. As directly elected individuals, they provide opportunities for greater collaboration and effective scrutiny of public services. In doing so, PCCs also have regard to national cross border threats, and ensure there is an effective policing response.

Represent the entire community

PCCs are required to swear an oath of impartiality when they are elected to office. The oath is designed so that they can publicly set out their commitment to: serve all of the people in their Police Force Area; act with integrity and diligence; give a voice to the public; act with transparency so that they may be effectively held to account; and not interfere with the operational independence of police officers.

About your vote

You need to be registered to be able to vote.

If you are not registered visit **www.gov.uk/register-to-vote** or contact your local council.

If you are registered, and eligible to vote you can either vote in person at a polling station, by post, or by proxy (allowing someone you trust to vote on your behalf).

PCCs are elected using the first past the post voting system, where the candidate with the most votes, wins. Voters will vote by choosing a single candidate on the ballot paper. This is the same system as UK Parliamentary elections.

Election statement:

As I talk to people across Hampshire and the Isle of Wight, they feel let down on crime and anti-social behaviour. It's time for change.

I have four priorities:

Policing not politics

In 2024/25, Hampshire's 'Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner' will cost taxpayers £3 million. The Liberal Democrats believe in abolishing Police and Crime Commissioners. I will return policing to the professionals and switch money back to the front line.

Work with communities

Since 2019, the number of Police Community Support Officers has fallen by 23% in Hampshire. I want to restore community policing and have stronger action on anti-social behaviour, with officers having time to focus on preventing and solving crime.

I also want to end disproportionate stop and search. In Hampshire & the Isle of Wight, people from black communities are much more likely to be stopped and searched. This damages trust in police and isn't delivering the results that any community wants. I want the police to work better with all Hampshire's communities and rebuild the trust so essential for cutting crime.

Fairer police funding

With most police funding decided nationally, Hampshire does badly – around £41.6 million worse off than it needs. We have fewer police officers than in 2010. I will stand up for Hampshire and the Isle of Wight, fight for fairer funding and work to reverse the fall in police numbers.

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Don JerrardThe Justice & Anti-Corruption Party



Election statement:

I was born and lived for most of my life in Hampshire. I was a partner in a major international law firm where I founded its IP/IT law department and have been a local councillor in Liss and Liphook since 2003.

In 2010 I co-founded the Justice & Anti-Corruption Party an independent party dedicated to obtaining justice for victims of abuse of power and exposing and combatting political and other corruption.

I stood in the 2012 and 2016 PCC elections because of my concern about the continued collapse of our criminal justice system. I campaigned against the closing of our courts, police stations and post offices. We need these vital local services paid for through our taxes.

It is fundamental to the criminal justice system that the judiciary and the police must be entirely independent of parliament and local councils who pass the laws and make up the rules.

I believe it was totally wrong that the PCCs could effectively be chosen by a political party. That was a route to providing unnecessary well paid jobs to retired policemen and clapped-out councillors, and would inevitably lead to cronyism and corruption. That is exactly what has happened in police forces across the country.

There was nothing wrong with the old system of local police authorities which were democratic, transparent and much cheaper.

So if elected I shall consult with the major political parties on how to disband the present system as soon as possible after the General Election.

I shall not take a salary for doing a job which should never have been created. I sincerely hope that in this way I can contribute to the restoration of a criminal justice system which we can trust and be proud of.

BACKGROUND

Donna has been the Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) for Hampshire and the Isle of Wight since 2021. Her professional background is in banking. From 2014 to 2018 she was the Leader of Portsmouth City Council.

Throughout the last 15 years Donna has combined her experience in the private / public sectors to improve public services. As PCC she represents over 250,000 businesses. To support this, she is on the board of the Hampshire Chamber of Commerce.

EXPERIENCE

Donna served as a Magistrate for 16 years, teaching her about offenders and the criminal justice system. She works with Probation Service, prisons and the CPS. She chairs the Hampshire and Isle of Wight Criminal Justice Board. Since July 2023, Donna has chaired the National Association of PCCs which makes her one of the four national police leaders

working with the Home Office. She sits on the National Policing Board (chaired by the Home Secretary) and co-chairs the National Policing Strategic Partnership Board.

As PCC, Donna has delivered:

- A Local Bobby for every community, with their name, phone number and email address published: https://hampshirealert.co.uk/Content/AllLocalAreas
- 650 more police officers.
- Funding to re-open 10 new police stations and front counters.
- Fixed the 101 call service, with call waiting times now under four minutes.
- Introduced a new Victims Hub.
- Commissioned £11m+ of victim and perpetrator support programmes, helping to make our communities safer.

If re-elected Donna will:

- Deliver 75 more police officers (next 12 months).
- Open more police stations and front counters.
- Crackdown on shoplifting and retail crime.
- Deliver a Rural Crime Taskforce.
- Invest in making our roads safer.
- Reduce serious violence.
- Ensure people reporting a crime get feedback.



As Police Area Returning Officer I am responsible for coordinating the election and announcing the result in Hampshire and Isle of Wight .




