About Police and Crime Commissioners

On 2nd May, you will be able to vote for your Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC). The role of the PCC is to be the voice of the people and to hold the police to account.

Police and Crime Commissioners are elected to hold your police force to account for delivering the kind of policing you want to see. PCCs are responsible for the totality of policing in their force area and aim to cut crime and deliver an effective and efficient police service. PCCs bring a public voice to policing and they do this by:

- Engaging with the public and victims of crime to help set police and crime plans;
- Ensuring the police force budget is spent where it matters most; and
- Appointing the chief constable, holding them to account for delivery of their objectives, and if necessary, dismissing them.

The PCC does not "run" the police force. Chief constables continue to be responsible for the day-to-day operations of the police, but they are accountable to the public via the PCC.

In some Police Force Areas, PCCs are also responsible for Fire and Rescue Services, and are known as Police, Fire and Crime Commissioners (PFCCs). Furthermore, in some areas, neither a PCC nor PFCC is elected – instead there will be an election for a Mayor who will hold the PCC, PFCC or equivalent powers.

37 PCCs will be elected across England and Wales, of which 4 will be PFCCs – PFCCs are found in Cumbria, Essex, Staffordshire, and Northamptonshire.

Work with others

PCCs also work with your council and other organisations to promote and enable joined up working on community safety and criminal justice. As directly elected individuals, they provide opportunities for greater collaboration and effective scrutiny of public services. In doing so, PCCs also have regard to national cross border threats, and ensure there is an effective policing response.

Represent the entire community

PCCs are required to swear an oath of impartiality when they are elected to office. The oath is designed so that they can publicly set out their commitment to: serve all of the people in their Police Force Area; act with integrity and diligence; give a voice to the public; act with transparency so that they may be effectively held to account; and not interfere with the operational independence of police officers.

About your vote

You need to be registered to be able to vote.

If you are not registered visit **www.gov.uk/register-to-vote** or contact your local council.

If you are registered, and eligible to vote you can either vote in person at a polling station, by post, or by proxy (allowing someone you trust to vote on your behalf).

PCCs are elected using the first past the post voting system, where the candidate with the most votes, wins. Voters will vote by choosing a single candidate on the ballot paper. This is the same system as UK Parliamentary elections.

Election statement:

I have lived and worked in Suffolk all my life and remain dedicated to improving the lives of Suffolk residents and keeping them safe. Good policing supports economic growth benefitting everyone.

Election statement:

The Liberal Democrats in Suffolk have a clear commitment to abolish the office of the Police and Crime Commissioner and put that money into frontline police services, crime prevention and victim support.

The functions of the PCC such as budget setting, scrutiny and crime prevention could be handled at County Council level. We have not seen any added value from the PCC role in Suffolk with no significant change in the funding formula, the poor deal that Suffolk policing gets from central Government (ours is the fourth lowest funded force per resident in the country) or a priority focus on rural policing. Instead, demands for yet more savings, increases in precepts, police station and front desk closures have resulted. There are now just three police stations in Suffolk open for public enquiries, and Suffolk Police have lost 75% of their Police Community Support Officers (PCSOs) since 2015.

Yet the office of Suffolk PCC has cost the taxpayer around £4.5 million in the last 5 years in running costs, salaries and expenses for the office. This election is your chance to send a message that this waste of money must end. With local crime services stretched, more money should be put directly into the frontline, not political "sinecures". If elected I will refuse to take up the position and will not claim any salary or expenses. My mission will be to campaign to get rid of the PCC in Suffolk and see resources redirected to fighting crime and supporting victims.

As Lib Dem leader Ed Davey has said "Right across the country, Police and Crime Commissioners have failed to tackle rural crime. The role needs to be abolished so that resources can go into what really matters – improving frontline policing".

Suffolk needs a Police and Crime Commissioner prepared to fight for safe and resilient communities.

My name is Rachel Smith-Lyte and I am your Green Party candidate to be the Police and Crime Commissioner for Suffolk. As a councillor and cabinet member for the environment at East Suffolk District Council, I have already been speaking up for our community.

Change can come. A year ago, 26% voted for the Green Party in council elections across Suffolk, compared to 35% for Conservative, 21% for Labour, 12% for LibDem and 6% for others. Greens are now part of the administration of three of the county's six councils. Your vote can make a difference.

IT'S TIME FOR A CHANGE

The Conservative record on policing and crime in Suffolk is awful. As the Conservative Parliamentary candidate for West Suffolk says: "We need to be much tougher on crime ... so there's a better police presence in our towns". This is what the Conservatives think about crime and policing after their own party has been running policing in Suffolk for eleven years!

I moved to Suffolk in 2019, after serving for 16 years as elected Mayor of Newham in east London. I tackled bureaucracy and waste so successfully that I froze council tax for 10 years without cutting services, funded 40 additional police officers, worked with police to cut knife crime by two thirds and prosecuted over 1200 criminal landlords. Our police officers had a higher arrest rate than their colleagues elsewhere.

I stand on my proven record and will apply the same rigour to improve policing and reduce crime in Suffolk. If elected I will sweep away bureaucracy, save money and focus resources on catching criminals.

My priorities:

- Enforce the law by improving detection rates and arresting more criminals (90% of neighbourhood crimes are currently unsolved).
- Clean up our towns: targeting county lines and taking a zero tolerance approach to shoplifting and anti-social behaviour.
- Tackle rural crime.

I will do this by:

- Delivering efficiency savings and re-investing in front line policing; supporting our hard-working dedicated police officers and support staff.
- Allocating additional police to be tasked locally let those who live in an area decide policing priorities.

This fight is between Labour and Conservative. A vote for anyone else will mean four more years of inaction on crime. Don't waste your vote.
